St. Andrew Presbyterian Church will be holding a Ten Thousand Villages Festival Sale on Saturday, November 16 from 9 am to 4 pm and Sunday, November 17 from 9 am to 2 pm. Set-up for the sale will be in the Fellowship Hall on the afternoon of Friday, November 15 which means that NLC parents will have the first opportunity to peruse (and purchase) all the wonderful sale items when they come to pick up children. Ten Thousand Villages is an exceptional source for unique handmade gifts, jewelry, home decor, art and sculpture, textiles, serveware and personal accessories representing the diverse cultures of artisans in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Middle East. One of the world's largest fair trade organizations and a founding member of the World Fair Trade Organization (WFTO), the company strives to improve the livelihood of tens of thousands of disadvantaged artisans in 38 countries. Ten Thousand Villages accomplishes this by establishing a sustainable market for handmade products in North America, and building long term buying relationships in places where skilled artisan partners lack opportunities for stable income. Product sales help pay for food, education, healthcare and housing for artisans who would otherwise be unemployed or underemployed. St. Andrew is able to keep 10% of the gross sales, and those funds will be donated to Loudoun Interfaith Relief, the local food pantry serving Loudoun County.

Active Parenting

Parenting was one of my highest joys when my children were still at home. A mentor had once modeled a great attitude to my wife, Bonnie, and me. When our oldest was a two-year-old, she had teenagers. Her continual refrain was: "I love having teenagers." This was a different tune to what we had usually heard, parents dreading adolescence with its increasing independence often fought out in conflict. Our mentor's attitude helped Bonnie and me to see that if we invested ourselves into practicing good parenting skills, we might someday be able to say much the same thing. In fact, we did. We ended up delighting in having teenage kids.



One resource was especially helpful, a program called *Active Parenting*. It encouraged parents to find a middle way between being dictatorial and a doormat, between having an autocratic style or a permissive style. Michael Popkin, the author of the program, invited those who learned the skills he taught to have an authoritative style, thriving as an "active" parent. He taught that children can not only be taught respect, but be respected, that the two go together. He gave ways to practice this essential vocation of parenting.

Popkin's chief premise is that children have four main goals. They wish to have connection, power, protection and the ability to withdraw. Children achieve these goals either in a healthy manner or in an unhealthy way. Seeking to achieve connection, for instance, positively they might contribute or cooperate, negatively they might pursue undue attention-seeking. Positive and negative examples of the power goal include independence and competence, positively, or rebellion, negatively. The active parent is able to pick up clues to their child's goals by the parent's own feelings. But instead of being *reactive*, the program taught skills that would help the parent being proactive in helping their children achieve their goals in a healthy manner.

Sometime in the new year, I am considering offering a six-session course on Active Parenting. I'd be delighted to have parents from the Neighborhood Learning Center participate. Please let Marcie or me know if you would be interested.
