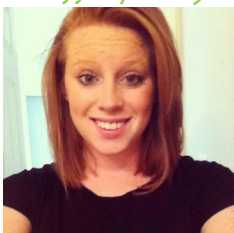
These are the basic elements of the story.

out there covering the nativity, from picture books with few words, rhyming books, and books for more advanced readers that parents and children can read and discuss together.

Use toys. A wooden nativity set is the perfect idea for young children leading up to Christmas. It gives them the materials they need to act out the Christmas story.

Sing songs. At school we will be singing and listening to traditional Christmas songs such as Away in the Manger and Joy to the World. Children love to sing, and many pickup words easily with repetition. For older children, songs can prove to be great conversation starters as you talk about the words you are singing.

Act it out. Invite older children to put on a play of the nativity for younger children. Act out the story, within your own family. You can also go to a show at church or visit a live nativity.

Make crafts. Using popsicle sticks and glue, make a manger for the baby Jesus. If you don't want to use real straw, Spanish moss will work just as well. A fun nativity craft that the entire family can enjoy is the making of an Advent calendar. Each day of December through Christmas Day, families do something special pertaining to some aspect of the birth of Jesus Christ.

The Nativity is important to understanding the spiritual reason for celebrating Christmas. Enjoy sharing this wonderful event with your family.

Our waiting is in expectation of Jesus to be born among us again. We wait also in expectation for Jesus to come again and bring near the Kingdom of God on earth.

eCheck and Credit Card Tuition Payment

As previously announced the NLC will be rolling out eChecks and Credit Card payment of tuition on January 1, 2014. Parents will have the option to pay online by eCheck or Credit Card as well as in person at the NLC desk from January 1 through the end of March. As of April 1, 2014 no checks will be accepted at the NLC desk, all payments will be made online by eCheck (free) or credit card for which a credit card processing fee of 2.97% charged by the credit card company will be added to the weekly tuition invoice.

Kid-Friendly Christmas Eve at 5:30

You have likely seen the Bethlehem mural in the northwest corner of our Fellowship Hall at St. Andrew. That’s a leftover of one of the best Christmas Eve services I have ever been a part of.

About five years ago, Pastor Jessica and I decided that we would abandon having sermons and formal prayers at our family Christmas Eve services. Instead, we thought it would be best to have a service that had as its goal: telling the Christmas story to the children. For the most part that means that the two of us do some kind of interactive drama. We star as goofy characters. We give the kids props to hold up at appropriate moments. We laugh and we wonder. We sing Christmas carols and always close with having everyone light a candle while singing “Silent Night.”

Two years ago, I wanted to do something different. Instead of drama, I had the idea that we could have a canvas put across the front of the sanctuary and have three artists paint the Christmas story as we told it in word and song. The children all sat up front.

To be honest, I thought that they had been bored because they were a lot quieter than most previous Christmas Eves. What I found out later was that they were mesmerized as they watched the painters work. The artists painted Joseph and Mary on their way to Bethlehem, then shepherds and angels, and finally the manger with a place for the baby in the cradle of hay.

As we drew our focus to the manger, I said that the little half circle that was meant to be the baby Jesus, just wasn’t quite enough. So, I asked: “Does anyone out there have a real baby we could have up here to help us remember Jesus’ birth. Three families were at the ready. “I’ve got a baby,” one father said from the back. Then the three families brought their newborns to the front. We baptized them. We celebrated that God came into the world as a little baby. And everyone went home remembering that best thing about Christmas is that Jesus came to live among us.

We aren’t having another art exhibition this winter. We are back to telling the story in a fun way, inviting the children and their families to laugh, ooh and ahh, wave props around and sing the songs of Christmas. Yes, at the end, we will turn down the lights at last, the glow of candles lighting our faces as we sing “Silent Night.” Through drama, art, song and welcome, we love to tell the story of Christmas so that the children can open their hearts to it (and their parents and grandparents, too). We invite all our Neighborhood Learning Center families to join us for the 5:30 service. Blessings on your preparations for Christmas.
